Participant Biographies

Fonteh Akum

Fonteh Akum is executive director at the Institute for Security Studies (ISS). He previously served as head of the Lake Chad Basin program in ISS's regional office in Dakar, Senegal. Prior to joining ISS as a senior researcher in the peace and security research program in 2017, he worked for the Council for the Development of Social Science Research in Africa, the UN University for Peace's Africa program, and the International Monetary Fund. Akum's research covers violence, governance, and human security in the Lake Chad Basin. He has a PhD in politics and international studies from the University of London's School of Oriental and African Studies.

Sergio M. Alcocer

Sergio M. Alcocer is president of the Mexican Council on Foreign Relations (COMEXI), research professor at the National Autonomous University of Mexico (UNAM) Institute of Engineering, and adjunct professor at the University of Texas at San Antonio. Alcocer is also the president of México Exponencial, a think tank for the development of public policy and strategies for embracing exponential technologies. He is former undersecretary for North America in the Mexican Ministry of Foreign Affairs and undersecretary for strategic planning and technology development at the Mexican Ministry of Energy. Alcocer is chair of Mexico City's Advisory Committee on Earthquakes and Resilience and member of the Advisory Committee on Structural Safety. He is an international member of the U.S. National Academy of Engineering, a member of the Mexican Academy of Sciences and Fundación ICA, an honorary member and former president of the Mexican Society of Structural Engineering (SMIE), and former president of the Academy of Engineering of Mexico. Alcocer was previously provost, coordinator for innovation and development, and director of the Institute of Engineering at UNAM. He was also a nonexecutive member of the board of Empresas ICA and chair of the board of Iberdrola México. He has received an honorary degree from the University of Arizona and was awarded the 2023 National Prize of Civil Engineering. Alcocer received his BS in civil engineering from UNAM and his PhD in structures from the University of Texas at Austin.

Kuniko Ashizawa

Kuniko Ashizawa is senior nonresident fellow at the Genron NPO. She also teaches international relations at George Washington University's Elliott School of International Affairs and American University's School of International Service. Ashizawa's research interests include Japan's foreign policy, regional institution-building in Asia, and global governance. She has published several academic journal articles and book chapters, including in the *International Studies Review, Pacific Affairs*, the *Pacific Review*, and the *Journal of Peacebuilding and Development*. Her book, *Japan, the U.S. and Regional Institution-Building in the New Asia: When Identity Matters*, received the 2015 Masayoshi Ohira Memorial Prize. Ashizawa has been a visiting fellow at various research institutions, including the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars, the East-West Center in Washington, and the School of Advanced International Studies's Reischauer Center for East Asian Studies. She received her PhD in international relations at Tufts University's Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy.

Avishay Ben-Sasson-Gordis

Avishay Ben-Sasson-Gordis is a lecturer in government at Harvard University and a Lady Davis postdoctoral fellow at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem. He studies international relations and political theory focusing on civil-military relations and Israeli foreign policy and security. His public-facing work has been featured in *Foreign Affairs*, *Just Security*, *World Politics Review*, and *Haaretz*. He holds a doctorate from Harvard University.

Esther Brimmer

Esther Brimmer is the James H. Binger senior fellow in global governance at the Council of Foreign Relations (CFR). Her primary areas of interest are international organizations and transatlantic relations. At CFR, she is writing a book on the need for better governance mechanisms to manage expanding human activities in outer space. She previously served as project director for CFR's task force report Arctic Imperatives: Reinforcing U.S. Strategy on America's Fourth Coast. From 2017 through 2022, Brimmer was executive director and CEO of NAFSA: Association of International Educators. She previously led U.S. policy in international organizations as the assistant secretary of state for International Organization Affairs from 2009 to 2013 and served on the policy planning staff from 1999 to 2001. Brimmer was the J.B. and Maurice C. Shapiro professor at George Washington University's Elliott School of International Affairs. She was the first deputy director and director of research at the Center for Transatlantic Relations (CTR) at the Johns Hopkins University's Paul H. Nitze School of Advanced International Studies from 2001 to 2009. While at CTR, Brimmer was also a visiting professor at the College of Europe in Bruges, Belgium. Brimmer has served in the private sector as a senior advisor at McLarty Associates, and earlier as an associate at McKinsey & Company. Early in her career, she was a senior associate at the Carnegie commission on preventing deadly conflict. Brimmer has published numerous articles and edited eight books on transatlantic relations, Brimmer received her bachelor's degree from Pomona College and master's degree and doctorate from Oxford University.

Chen Dongxiao

Chen Dongxiao is senior research fellow and president of the Shanghai Institutes for International Studies (SIIS). As an adjunct professor at the Shanghai International Studies University, Chen also holds the position of vice chair of the China National Association of International Relations. He specializes in the studies of United Nations, China's foreign policy, and China-U.S. relations. Chen has published extensively on China's diplomacy, major power relationships, UN reform, and global governance. As SIIS president and senior policy adviser to the Chinese government, he has chaired numerous research projects commissioned by the Chinese Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Ministry of Finance, and the Taiwan Affairs Office of the State Council, and has supervised extensive academic publications supported by the China National Foundation of Social Sciences. Chen is the editor-in-chief of the Global Review and the China Quarterly of International Strategic Studies, both the SIIS flagship journals in Chinese and English respectively on China's diplomacy. He is also the founding editor-in-chief of the SIIS Report, an English-language think tank report series that aims to exchange ideas and present proposals from the leading Chinese think tanks on common agendas facing the international community. As an eminent policy advisor to the Chinese government, Chen is senior advisor on

economic diplomacy for the Chinese Ministry of Foreign Affairs and senior advisor to the Mayor of Shanghai's International Business Leaders Advisory Council. Alongside his academic and advisory roles, he is a high-level advisor to the UN Dialogues at the Economic and Social Council's independent team of advisors on longer-term positioning of the UN development system, and a member of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) Regional Forum's expert and eminent persons, among others. Chen earned his PhD from Fudan University.

Chaesung Chun

Chaesung Chun is chair of the East Asia Institute's (EAI) National Security Center and professor at Seoul National University's department of political science and international relations. He is a member of the advisory committees of South Korea's Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Ministry of Defense, Republic of Korea Army, and Republic of Korea Navy. He was president of the Korean Association of International Studies, director of Seoul National University's Center for International Studies, and a vice president of Seoul National University's Institute of Peace and Unification Studies. Chun also was a visiting professor at Keio University in Tokyo from 2017 to 2018 and from 2010 to 2011. His major works include Sovereignty and International Relations: Northeast Asian International Relations Theory: Politics among Incomplete Sovereign States; Sovereignty and International Relations: Modern Sovereign States System and the Evolution of the Empire; and Is Politics Moral: Reinhold Niebuhr's Transcendental Realism, East Asian International Relations. He received his BA and MA from Seoul National University and his PhD in international relations theory from Northwestern University.

Thierry de Montbrial

Thierry de Montbrial is executive chair of the French Institute of International Relations (Ifri), which he founded in 1979. He is also professor emeritus at the Conservatoire National des Arts et Métiers. In 2008, he launched the World Policy Conference. He has been a member of the Académie des Sciences Morales et Politiques of the Institut de France since 1992, and is a member of a number of foreign academies. From 1974 to 1992, de Montbrial chaired the Ecole Polytechnique's department of economics. He was the first chair of the Foundation for Strategic Research (1993–2001). He created the policy planning staff at the French Ministry of Foreign Affairs and served as its first director from 1973 to 1979. De Montbrial is the author of more than twenty books, several of them translated into various languages, including *Action and Reaction in the World System* and *Living in Troubled Times*. He is a grand officer of the Legion of Honor, a grand officer of the National Order of Merit, and a recipient of the Order of the Rising Sun—Gold and Silver Star in Japan in 2009—among other state honors. A graduate of the Ecole Polytechnique and the Ecole des Mines, de Montbrial holds a PhD in mathematical economics from the University of California, Berkeley.

Francisco de Santibañes

Francisco de Santibañes is president of the Argentine Council for International Relations (CARI), global fellow at the Wilson Center for International Scholars, and professor at Austral University. He is also author of Argentina and the World: Keys for a Successful Integration; The Rebellion of Nations: Crisis of Liberalism and Rise of Popular Conservatism; and From Perpetual Twilight to Strategic Development. De

Santibañes is also the author of numerous articles published in magazines specialized in Argentina and abroad.

Yose Rizal Damuri

Yose Rizal Damuri is the executive director of the Centre for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS). His research focuses on international trade, regional integration, and the globalization of value chains. He is also interested in examining the political-economic aspects of international economic governance and the multilateral trading system, has authored several academic articles on those subjects, and is currently directing his attention toward the implications of major power rivalries on the global and regional economic landscape. Damuri is active in many East Asian research institutes, including the Asia Pacific Research Network on Trade, the Research Institutes Network for the Economic Research Institute for ASEAN and East Asia (ERIA), and Think 20, the think tank network of Group of Twenty countries. He serves as the co-chair of the Indonesian National Committee of Pacific Economic Cooperation. Damuri is also active in various Indonesian policy forums, including as the research coordinator of Indonesia Service Dialogue, a forum dedicated to the development of the services sector in Indonesia. He received his PhD in international economics from the Graduate Institute of International Studies.

Amy Dobbin

Amy Dobbin is the chief operating officer and company secretary at the Lowy Institute. She leads the institute's finance and operational functions, including business development, events, and media and communications. Dobbin was previously a senior policy advisor to Australian Prime Minster Malcolm Turnbull, responsible for legal, technology, media, and telecommunications policy. She also worked as a commercial lawyer at the global law firm Allens Linklaters, and as an executive with a UK venture firm and an Australian technology company. In 2020, the Australian government appointed Dobbin as an Australian Youth Ambassador for Development, and she completed a posting as legal advisor with the UN Children's Fund in Ghana. She graduated with a degree in arts and law from the University of Sydney and earned a master's degree in business administration from the London Business School.

Tracey Forrest

Tracey Forrest is research director of transformative technologies at the Centre for International Governance Innovation (CIGI). Her experience spans many areas, including renewable energy and quantum technologies, and has entailed working with multi-sectoral partners to accelerate the transition of products from laboratory curiosities to impactful devices. At CIGI, she leads a network of researchers focused on opportunities and challenges related to the evolving interface of transformative technologies and international governance. Forrest is a professional engineer, adjunct professor at the University of Waterloo, and former board member of several technology and environmentally focused organizations. Over the course of a career in both academia and industry, Forrest has become an authority on bridging emerging technology to high-value applications. She is a member of the Federation of Canadian Municipalities Green Municipal Fund Council, and formerly served as director of the transformative quantum technologies program at the University of Waterloo and advisory board chair of the National Research Council of Canada's Nanotechnology Research Centre. Forrest

completed a bachelor's in applied science degree in environmental (chemical) engineering at the University of Waterloo and a master's degree in energy and environmental economics at the Scuola Mattei. She has also completed professional training in topics such as quantum, data science, and sustainable business strategy at Harvard University and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Michael Froman

Michael Froman is president of the Council on Foreign Relations (CFR). He previously served as vice chair and president of strategic growth at Mastercard and chair of the Mastercard Center for Inclusive Growth. He was also a distinguished fellow at CFR from 2017 to 2023. Froman served in President Barack Obama's cabinet as the U.S. trade representative from 2013 to 2017. From 2009 to 2013, he served at the White House as assistant to the president and deputy national security advisor for international economic affairs, where he was responsible for coordinating policy on international trade, finance, energy, climate change, and development issues, and served as the U.S. sherpa for the Group of Twenty and Group of Eight summits. Prior to joining the Obama administration, Froman held a number of roles at Citigroup. He was also a senior fellow at CFR and a resident fellow at the German Marshall Fund. In the 1990s, Froman spent seven years in the U.S. government. He served as chief of staff and as deputy assistant secretary for Eurasia and the Middle East at the U.S. Department of Treasury. He also worked at the White House as director for international economic affairs at the National Security Council and National Economic Council. Froman received a bachelor's degree in public and international affairs from Princeton University, a doctorate in international relations from Oxford University, and law degree from Harvard Law School, where he was an editor of the Harvard Law Review.

Michael Fullilove

Michael Fullilove has served as the executive director of the Lowy Institute since 2012. He wrote the feasibility study for the Lowy Institute in 2002 and was the director of its global issues program from 2003 to 2012. He was previously a visiting fellow in foreign policy at the Brookings Institution, an adviser to Australian Prime Minister Paul Keating, and a lawyer. Fullilove serves on the advisory council of the International Institute for Strategic Studies. He has authored several prize-winning books and writes widely on Australian and U.S. foreign policy for, among others, the *Financial Times*, *Foreign Affairs* and the *New York Times*. In 2019, Fullilove was appointed a member of the Order of Australia for significant service to international relations. Thomas Gomart

Thomas Gomart has been the director of the French Institute of International Relations (Ifri) since 2015. He is a member of the Institute of Advanced Studies in National Defence's scientific committee and the editorial board of the French journals *Politique étrangère*, *Revue des deux mondes*, and *Etudes*. Gomart was a member of the French Ministry of Armed Forces' strategic review committee for its *Strategic Review of Defence and National Security 2017*. Matthew P. Goodman

Prior to joining CFR in September 2023, Goodman was senior vice president for economics and Simon chair in political economy at the Center for Strategic and International Studies. From 2010 to 2012, he served as director for international economics on the National Security Council staff, helping the U.S. president prepare for global and regional summits, including for the Group of Twenty, Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation, and East Asia Summit. Prior to serving in the White House, Goodman was senior advisor to the undersecretary for economic affairs at the U.S. Department of State. Before joining the Barack Obama administration in 2009, Goodman worked for five years at Albright Stonebridge Group, where he was managing director for Asia. From 2002 to 2004, he served at the White House as director for Asian economic affairs on the National Security Council staff. Prior to that, he spent five years at Goldman Sachs, heading the bank's government affairs operations in Tokyo and London. From 1988 to 1997, he worked as an international economist at the U.S. Treasury Department, including five years as financial attaché at the U.S. embassy in Tokyo. Ettore Greco

Ettore Greco is executive vice president of the Institute of International Affairs (IAI). He also heads the institute's multilateralism and global governance program. He was previously the director of IAI from 2008 to 2017, worked as visiting fellow at the Brookings Institution from 2006 to 2007, and taught at the University of Parma and the University of Bologna. Tamir Hayman

During his thirty-four years of IDF service, Hayman held a wide range of command positions in the ground forces including operational combat experience in the security zone in Lebanon and in the Palestinian arena. Hayman joined the IDF general staff in 2015 and served as commander of the National Defense College while also acting as commander of the Northern Corps, where he led the largest training exercise ever carried out by the IDF. Dhruva Jaishankar

Dhruva Jaishankar is executive director of the Observer Research Foundation (ORF) America, which he founded in 2020. He is also a nonresident fellow with the Lowy Institute and writes a monthly column on international affairs for the *Hindustan Times*. Between 2012 and 2020, Jaishankar held positions at the Observer Research Foundation, as a fellow at Brookings India, the Brookings Institution, and the German Marshall Fund, and was a visiting fellow at the S. Rajaratnam School of International Studies in Singapore. He has published research on India's relations with the United States, Australia, Europe, Japan, and Southeast Asia; defense and security policy; and globalization, democracy, and technology. Stefan Mair

Stefan Mair is director and executive chair of the German Institute for International and Security Affairs (SWP). Andrea Renda

Vázquez was also accredited as a representative of the Argentine government to various regional and international organizations and conferences and negotiated the political pillar of the Mercosur-EU Agreement. Andrés Rozental

Andrés Rozental is president of the consulting firm Rozental and Asociados, which advises multinational companies on their corporate strategies in Latin America. He was founding president of the Mexican Council on Foreign Relations (COMEXI). He is also active in nongovernmental organizations and projects relating to global governance, migration policy, climate change, Latin American politics, and promoting democracy. Leigh Morris Sloane

Philips J. Vermonte

Makhtar Diop is the managing director of the International Finance Corporation (IFC), the private sector arm of the World Bank Group. He is responsible for advancing economic opportunity in emerging and developing markets through private sector development. His priorities include tackling climate change and food insecurity, creating opportunities for women, and connecting emerging markets with the digital economy. A collaborative and creative leader, Diop strives to bring new and diverse voices into the global development conversation. He has served in leadership positions in both the public and private sectors throughout his distinguished career, giving him unique insights into global development. He joined the World Bank Group in 2001, where he held various positions, most recently as vice president for infrastructure and vice president for Africa. An economist by training, Diop started his career in the banking industry before joining the International Monetary Fund. He also served as minister of economy and finance for his home country of Senegal. A recognized thought leader in the fields of economics and social development, Diop has been named one of the one hundred most influential Africans in the world. He holds degrees in economics from the University of Warwick and University of Nottingham in England.

Kurt M. Campbell

Kurt M. Campbell was sworn in as the twenty-second U.S. deputy secretary of state on February 12, 2024. Prior to assuming this position, Campbell served as deputy assistant to the president and coordinator for Indo-Pacific affairs on the National Security Council. He was previously founding chair and chief executive officer of the Asia Group, LLC, a strategic advisory and capital management group. From 2009 to 2013, Campbell served as the assistant secretary of state for East Asian and Pacific affairs. Earlier, he was the CEO and cofounder of the Center for a New American Security and concurrently served as the director of the Aspen Strategy Group and chair of the editorial board of the Washington Quarterly. Among the other positions he has held during his distinguished career, Campbell served as deputy assistant secretary of defense for Asian and Pacific affairs, White House fellow at the Treasury Department, and as director of the democracy office at the National Security Council during the Bill Clinton administration. He was an associate professor of public policy at Harvard's John F. Kennedy School of Government and served in the U.S. Navy Reserves. Campbell is the author or editor of ten books, including The Pivot: The Future of American Statecraft in Asia; Difficult Transitions: Why Presidents Fail in Foreign Policy at the Outset of Power; and Hard Power: The New Politics of National Security. Campbell is the recipient of numerous awards, including the secretary of state's distinguished service award. He received his BA from the University of California, San Diego, and his doctorate in international relations from Oxford University, where he was a distinguished Marshall scholar.

Bruce Mehlman

Bruce Mehlman is partner at Mehlman Consulting and has over two decades experience in public policy, business, and the law, and helps leaders and organizations understand, anticipate, and navigate political risk. His quarterly infographic analyses are consistently picked up by national media and eagerly consumed by tens of thousands of readers around the world. Mehlman is often featured on CNBC, Fox News, Fox Business, and Hearst to discuss policy and political trends and their implications. Mehlman previously served as assistant secretary of commerce for technology policy under U.S.
