# Managing Global Catastrophic Risk: Nuclear Weapons

# Alyssa Ayres

Alyssa Ayres is senior fellow for India, Pakistan, and South Asia at the Council on Foreign Relations. Ayres served as U.S. deputy assistant secretary of state for South Asia from 2010 to 2013, and has more than twenty-five years of experience in India and South Asia spanning the government, nonprofit, and private sectors. She served as project director for two bipartisan task forces on U.S.-India relations, coedited three books on India and Indian foreign policy, and wrote a book about nationalism in Pakistan, *Speaking Like a State*. Her latest book, *Our Time Has Come: How India Is Making Its Place in the World*, is about India's rise. She holds an AB from Harvard College and an MA and PhD from the University of Chicago.

# Steven Blockmans

Steven Blockmans is the head of European Union foreign policy at the Centre for European Policy Studies and professor of EU external relations law and governance at the University of Amsterdam. Blockmans has advised governments in wider Europe and Asia on their relations with the EU. He is a frequent media commentator and has been the leading author on task forces such as More Union in European Defence and Regroup and Reform: Towards a More Responsive and Effective European Union. His latest book, *The Obsolescence of the European Neighborhood Policy*, deals with the neighborhood policy in context of the emergence of a more realist EU foreign policy. He is an editor of fifteen academic volumes, including *The EU's Role in Global Governance*.

# Thomas J. Bollyky

Thomas J. Bollyky is director of the global health program and senior fellow for global health, economics, and development at the Council on Foreign Relations (CFR). He is also an adjunct professor of law at Georgetown University. Bollyky directed the first CFR-sponsored Independent Task Force devoted to global health, titled *The Emerging Global Health Crisis: Noncommunicable Diseases in Low- and Middle-Income Countries.* He is the author of the book *Plagues and the Paradox of Progress: Why the World Is Getting Healthier in Worrisome Ways.* Prior to joining CFR, Bollyky was a fellow at the Center for Global Development and director of intellectual property and pharmaceutical policy at the Office of the U.S. Trade Representative. He was also a Fulbright scholar to South Africa, where he worked as a staff attorney at the AIDS Law Project, and an attorney at Debevoise & Plimpton LLP. Bollyky has testified multiple times before the U.S. Senate, and his work has appeared in many publications, including *Atlantic, Foreign Affairs*, and *New York Times.* He has served as a consultant to the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation and as a temporary legal advisor to the World Health Organization. In 2013, the World Economic Forum named Bollyky as one of its global leaders under forty. Bollyky received a BA in biology and history from Columbia University and a JD from Stanford Law School.

# Mariana Campero

Mariana Campero is chief executive officer of the Mexican Council on Foreign Relations (COMEXI). Previously, she was vice president of Zemi Communications LLC, a strategic consulting firm that focuses on cross-border communication and strategy for blue-chip corporations and governments in Latin America. Campero was also senior director at Llorente y Cuenca and global coordinator of the AMO Partnership, a global alliance of strategic communications consultancies. She founded Toi & Moi, was a founding partner of Fit-Me in Mexico, and is a member of the advisory council of Citibanamex and a TV commentator. She holds a BBA from the Instituto Tecnológico Autónomo de México and an MA from Columbia University.

# Thierry de Montbrial

Thierry de Montbrial is executive chairman of the French Institute of International Relations (IFRI), which he founded in 1979, and professor emeritus at the Conservatoire National des Arts et Métiers. In 2008, he

launched the World Policy Conference. A member of the Académie des Sciences Morales et Politiques at the Institut de France since 1992, he is also a member of several other foreign academies. The first chairman of the Foundation for Strategic Research, serving from 1993 to 2001, de Montbrial also chaired the department of economics at the Ecole Polytechnique from 1974 to 1992. Earlier, he created the Policy Planning Staff at the French Ministry of Foreign Affairs and served as its first director, from 1973 to 1979. The author of more than twenty books, several of them translated in various languages, including *Action and Reaction in the World System* and *Living in Troubled Times*, he is a commander of the Legion of Honor, a grand officer of the National Order of Merit, and a recipient of the Order of the Rising Sun—Gold and Silver Star in Japan in 2009—as well as other state honors. A graduate of the Ecole Polytechnique and the Ecole des Mines, de Montbrial holds a PhD in mathematical economics from the University of California, Berkeley.

#### Francisco de Santibañes

Francisco de Santibañes is an executive committee member of the Argentine Council for International Relations (CARI) and a member of the International Institute for Strategic Studies and the World Economic Forum. He also teaches at the Diplomatic Academy of Argentina. He is the author of Argentina and the World: Steps for Successful Integration. His second book, The Rebellion of Nations: the Crisis of Liberalism and the Rise of Popular Conservatism, will be published in 2019. De Santibañes has written articles for Armed Forces and Society, Comparative Strategy, and Archivos del Presente, and reports for the Center for Strategic and International Studies and CARI. He holds an MA in international relations from Johns Hopkins University's School of Advanced International Studies and has pursued doctoral studies at the Department of War Studies at King's College London.

# Susanne Droege

Susanne Droege is a senior fellow in the Global Issues Division at the German Institute for International and Security Affairs (SWP), where she specializes in energy, climate, and international economics. She advises the German government, the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development, the UN Environment Program, and the World Trade Organization on climate policy issues. Her work experience encompasses trade and the environment, including economic policy instruments. Her research focuses on emissions trading and countries' climate policy strategies, the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change negotiations, security policy implications of climate change, and trade policy implications of nationally determined contributions and the Paris Agreement. Droege teaches university classes in environmental and resource economics. A member of several advisory boards, she has held various positions in German research institutions. She holds an undergraduate diploma from the Free University of Berlin and the University of Warwick and a doctorate from the Leipzig Graduate School of Management.

# Anton du Plessis

Anton du Plessis is executive director of the Institute for Security Studies (ISS) and has worked on human security, international criminal justice, and rule of law issues in more than twenty African countries, with a focus on delivering training and technical assistance to senior law enforcement and criminal justice officials. He is an admitted advocate of the High Court of South Africa with more than fourteen years of legal and management experience. He has been a consultant and expert advisor to various UN entities and other intergovernmental organizations, including the UN Security Council's Counter-Terrorism Executive Directorate and the UN Counter-Terrorism Implementation Task Force. Du Plessis is a World Economic Forum (WEF) Young Global Leader (2014–20) and vice chair of WEF's Global Agenda Council on Terrorism. Before assuming his current positions, he served as head of the Transnational Threats and International Crimes Division, which he founded in 2008 at ISS. Previously, he was a criminal justice and

counterterrorism legal expert for the UN Office on Drugs and Crime, and before that he was head of the crime and justice program at ISS. Du Plessis has also worked as a senior state advocate at the National Prosecuting Authority of South Africa where he specialized in the prosecution of serious and violent offences. He has published numerous articles, book chapters, and training guides and is the coauthor of *Counter-Terrorism Law and Practice*. Du Plessis holds three law degrees, both undergraduate and graduate.

#### **Ralf Emmers**

Ralf Emmers is dean and president's chair in International Relations at Nanyang Technological University's S. Rajaratnam School of International Studies. His research interests include security studies, international institutions in the Asia-Pacific, and the security and international politics of Southeast Asia. The author or editor of eleven books and monographs, including Cooperative Security and the Balance of Power in ASEAN and the ARF, Geopolitics and Maritime Territorial Disputes in East Asia, and Resource Management and Contested Territories in East Asia, Emmers has written articles for many peer-reviewed journals, including Asian Survey, Australian Journal of International Affairs, and Global Change, as well as numerous book chapters in edited volumes. He completed his MSc and PhD in the international relations department of the London School of Economics and Political Science.

#### Ferdinando Nelli Feroci

Ferdinando Nelli Feroci is president of the Institute of International Affairs (IAI) and a professor at LUIIS University's School of Government. Appointed as Italy's member of the European Commission in 2014, he served as a diplomat from 1972 to 2013 as permanent representative of Italy to the European Union, chief of staff to the Italian minister of foreign affairs, and director general for European integration at the Italian Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Previously, he served at the United Nations and in Algeria, China, and France and was also diplomatic counselor to the vice president of the Italian Council of Ministers. Nelli Feroci was previously a fellow at Harvard University's Center for International Affairs and a visiting professor at the Istituto Universitario Orientale in Naples. He is the author of many articles and essays on international relations, European affairs, and political affairs. He holds a doctorate in international law from the University of Pisa and a postdoctoral specialization in international relations from SIOS in Rome.

#### Michael Fullilove

Michael Fullilove is executive director of the Lowy Institute, serving as director of its global issues program from 2003 to 2012. He has also been a visiting fellow in foreign policy at the Brookings Institution, an advisor to Prime Minister Paul John Keating of Australia, and a lawyer. He remains a nonresident senior fellow at the Brookings Institution. He has written several books and writes widely on Australian and U.S. foreign policy for, among others, *Financial Times*, *Foreign Affairs*, *New York Times*, and the Australian press. He graduated in arts and law from the University of Sydney and the University of New South Wales, with dual university medals. Fullilove studied as a Rhodes scholar at Oxford University, where he received a master's degree and a doctorate in international relations.

#### Oliver Geden

Oliver Geden is head of the European Union/Europe Research division at the German Institute for International and Security Affairs (SWP) and a research associate at the University of Oxford's Institute for Science, Innovation and Society. His work focuses on European and global climate policy, including the governance of carbon dioxide removal and solar radiation management. Geden has been a visiting scholar at the Max Planck Institute for Meteorology, the Swiss Federal Institute of Technology, and the University of California, Berkeley, among others. During his time at SWP, he has been seconded to the policy planning units

of both the German Federal Foreign Office and German Federal Ministry for Economic Affairs and Energy. Geden is the lead author for the Sixth Assessment Report of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change. He holds a PhD from Humbolt University Berlin.

# Adalberto Rodríguez Giavarini

Adalberto Rodríguez Giavarini is president of the Argentine Council for International Relations (CARI) and former minister of foreign affairs of the Argentine Republic. He previously served as a member of the National Congress, minister of economy for Buenos Aires, and undersecretary of the treasury and secretary of defense. A member of the advisory council at Konex Foundation and the grand jury for the Konex Foundation Awards, he also runs the foreign affairs chapter of the Political Action Network Foundation. Rodríguez Giavarini also chairs the executive board of his consulting group specializing in national, regional, and international political economics as well as the boards of many private universities. He is vice president of the National Academy of Education in Argentina and the treasurer of the board of directors at the National Academy of Moral and Political Sciences. Rodríguez Giavarini has spoken at several seminars and conferences in Argentina and abroad and has published numerous essays and articles in national and international newspapers and magazines. A professor honoris causa at Soka University in Japan, he has received decorations from sixteen countries. Rodríguez Giavarini received his degree in economics from the University of Buenos Aires, to which he later returned as professor of macroeconomics.

#### **Thomas Gomart**

Thomas Gomart is director of the French Institute of International Relations (IFRI). Previously, he was vice president for strategic development and the director and founder of the Russia/NIS Center at IFRI. Before joining IFRI, Gomart was an assistant professor at the Sorbonne and a cadet officer. He has focused on the former Soviet Union as well as wider international issues such as security, energy, and digital governance. He was previously a Lavoisier fellow at the Moscow State Institute of International Relations, visiting fellow at the European Union Institute for Security Studies, and Marie Curie fellow at the Department of War Studies at King's College London. Gomart recently published *Notre Intérêt National*, edited with Thierry de Montbrial; "Europe: Subject or Object in the Geopolitics of Data?" edited with Julien Nocetti and Clément Tonon, and *L'Affolement du Monde: 10 Enjeux Géopolitiques.* A member of the Strategic Review Committee for the Defence and National Security Strategic Review 2017, he is also a member of the editorial board of the French journals *Etudes, Politique Etrangère*, and *Revue des Deux Mondes.* Gomart received his EMBA from Hautes Etudes Commerciales de Paris and his PhD in history from Pantheon-Sorbonne University.

# Young-Sun Ha

Young-Sun Ha is chairman of the board of trustees of the East Asia Institute and a professor emeritus at Seoul National University's department of political science and international relations. A member of the senior advisory group for the inter-Korean summit preparation committee, he also served as a member of the Presidential National Security Advisory Group, co-chairman of the Joint Research Project for a New Era for Korea-Japan Relations, president of the Korean Association of Peace Studies, and research fellow at Princeton University's Center for International Security Studies and the Stockholm International Peace Research Institute. Ha's recent books and edited volumes include Complex World Politics, U.S.-China Competition in the Architecture of a Regional Order in the Asia-Pacific, and Young Pioneers in Korean History. He received his BA and MA from Seoul National University and his PhD from the University of Washington.

#### **Richard Haass**

Richard Haass is in his sixteenth year as president of the Council on Foreign Relations, the preeminent

independent, nonpartisan organization in the United States devoted to issues of foreign policy and international relations. He has served as the senior Middle East advisor to President George H.W. Bush and as the State Department's director of policy planning under Secretary of State Colin Powell. He was also U.S. coordinator for policy toward the future of Afghanistan and the U.S. envoy to both the Cyprus and Northern Ireland peace talks. A recipient of the State Department's Distinguished Honor Award, the Presidential Citizens Medal, and the Tipperary International Peace Award, Haass is also the author or editor of thirteen books on U.S. foreign policy and one book on management. His latest book is *A World in Disarray: American Foreign Policy and the Crisis of the Old Order*. A Rhodes scholar, he holds master's and doctor of philosophy degrees from Oxford University.

# **Penny Hunt**

Penny Hunt has since 2009 been executive director of the Robina Foundation, a private organization based in Minneapolis that provides grants to four major institutions: Abbott Northwestern Hospital/Allina Health, the Council on Foreign Relations, the University of Minnesota Law School, and Yale University. The Robina Foundation is a unique, time-limited foundation that seeks to benefit social issues of importance by encouraging innovation and financially supporting the transformative projects of its partners. Unique in the foundation world, the Robina Foundation is a time-limited foundation, seeking to have a transformative, long-term impact on grantees and issues of importance through major grants. She earned a BA from Carleton College, was a Fulbright scholar in Lyon, France, holds an MA from Duke University, and received a JD from the William Mitchell College of Law.

# Sunjoy Joshi

Sunjoy Joshi is chairman and chief executive of the Observer Research Foundation and vice president of the Mountain Children's Foundation, a nonprofit organization that works with disadvantaged children in the Himalayas. He focuses on energy, the environment, nontraditional security threats, and the challenges to growth and employment that emerging economies face amid unprecedented technological disruptions worldwide. Previously, he was a member of the Indian Administrative Service, where he worked on development and economic policies. Joshi has been a visiting associate at the International Institute for Strategic Studies in London and a distinguished visitor to Stanford University's program on energy and sustainable development. He holds an MA in English literature from Allahabad University and an MA in development studies from the University of East Anglia.

# Memduh Karakullukçu

Memduh Karakullukçu is vice chairman and president of the Global Relations Forum (GRF). His policy work includes global energy dynamics, European energy security, global economic and financial governance, and the economic prospects of the Middle East and North Africa region. During his tenure at ITU, Karakullukçu was senior advisor to the president; coordinator of the law, technology, and policy graduate program; and strategic advisor at the university's Center for Satellite Communications. He has also served as a member of the academic staff at ITU and the London School of Economics and Political Science (LSE). Earlier in his career, he worked as a specialist in structured finance in London and Istanbul. Karakullukçu received a BS in electrical engineering and economics from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, an MSc in finance from LSE, and a JD from Columbia University.

# Yasushi Kudo

Yasushi Kudo is the founder and president of the Genron NPO. Under Kudo's leadership, Genron NPO has conducted various research programs, including evaluations of government performance and analyses of party pledges made during general elections. With its Northeast Asia regional program, Kudo has developed crucial track two dialogues, such as the annual Tokyo-Beijing Forum and Japan-Korea Future Dialogue, to tackle pressing regional issues. In 2017, Kudo launched the Tokyo Conference, a discussion platform that invites ten international think tanks to exchange views on global issues and propose recommendations to strengthen the liberal order and democracy. The Asia Forum of Opinion Leaders was established in 2016 as a venue for open and free debate among intellectuals in Japan and Southeast Asian countries. The forum is a collaborative effort to bolster democracy and address challenges the democratic system faces, with a goal of jointly identifying common issues and presenting potential solutions. Prior to founding Genron NPO, Kudo was editor in chief of the political journal *Ronso Toyo Keizai*. He holds a master's degree in economics from Yokohama City University.

# Sergey Kulik

Sergey Kulik is director for international studies at the Institute of Contemporary Development as well as a member of both the academic council of the Security Council of the Russian Federation and the Council on Foreign and Defense Policy. Elliott Abrams is special representative for Venezuela at the U.S. Department of State while on a leave of absence from the Council on Foreign Relations in Washington, DC. Previously, he served as deputy assistant to the president and deputy national security advisor in the George W. Bush administration, where he supervised U.S. policy in the Middle East for the White House. After serving on the staffs of Senators Henry M. Jackson and Daniel P. Moynihan, he was an assistant secretary of state in the Ronald Reagan administration, receiving the Secretary's Distinguished Service Award from Secretary of State George P. Shultz. He is the author of *Realism and Democracy: American Foreign Policy After the Arab Spring.* Abrams received a BA from Harvard, an MSc from the London School of Economics and Political Science, and a JD from Harvard Law School.

#### **Karen Donfried**

Karen Donfried is president of the German Marshall Fund of the United States (GMF), a nonprofit organization dedicated to strengthening transatlantic cooperation, and a senior fellow at Harvard University's Center for European Studies. Before joining GMF in 2014, Donfried was special assistant to the president and senior director for European affairs on the National Security Council at the White House. # Mara Liasson

Mara Liasson is the national political correspondent for National Public Radio (NPR), where her reports can be heard regularly on *All Things Considered* and *Morning Edition*. Liasson provides extensive coverage of politics and policy from Washington, DC—focusing on the White House and U.S. Congress—and reports on political trends beyond the beltway. # Edward R. Royce

Edward R. Royce is policy director at Brownstein Hyatt Farber Schreck. Royce served in the U.S. House of Representatives for twenty-six years, representing California's thirty-ninth district and serving as chair of the House Foreign Affairs Committee from 2013 to 2019. While in office, Royce authored legislation to address threats from Iran, North Korea, and Russia, and modernized export control laws. He also served as a senior member on the House Financial Services Committee, where he led efforts to enact regulatory reforms affecting insurers and credit unions. Royce authored the Eliminate, Neutralize, and Disrupt (END) Wildlife Trafficking Act, which combats the illegal poaching and trafficking of imperiled species, and coauthored the Electrify Africa Act, which provides access to power for lifesaving medical treatments and modern technologies. During his last year in office, Royce shepherded the Better Utilization of Investments Leading to Development (BUILD) Act—which enhances U.S. programs that support expansion and job creation in developing economies in Africa and around the world—through Congress. As a California state senator, Royce wrote the nation's first anti-stalking law. Royce is a graduate of the California State University's Fullerton School of Business Administration.

# Justin Vaïsse

Justin Vaïsse is director general and founder of the Paris Peace Forum, an independent nonprofit organization created in 2018 under the impetus of French President Emmanuel Macron. Prior to that role, Vaïsse was director of policy planning at the French Ministry for Foreign Affairs for more than six years. From 2007 to 2013, he was director of research for the Center on the United States and Europe and a senior fellow in foreign policy at the Brookings Institution. Vaïsse is the author or coauthor of numerous books on the United States, including *Neoconservatism: The Biography of a Movement*, and *Zbigniew Brzezinski: America's Grand Strategist*.
