

Guiding questions: Is it possible to revive a truly multilateral global trading system, with the World Trade Organization (WTO) at its core? What could be done to reinvigorate the WTO's leadership in negotiating trade liberalization, rulemaking, and dispute settlement? Given obstacles to the "single undertaking" approach to trade liberalization, what sectors or issues are most ripe for plurilateral agreements among subsets of WTO members? Today's global economy has seen a proliferation of sectoral, bilateral, and regional trade agreements, which, while beneficial to members, risk the fragmentation of the global trading system into exclusionary blocs with different rules. What if anything should or can be done to mitigate these risks? What role can or should the WTO play in preventing member states from using national security exceptions to unilaterally implement trade restrictions?

Participant Biographies

Fonteh Akum

Fonteh Akum is executive director of the Institute for Security Studies (ISS). Before joining ISS as senior researcher in the Peace and Security Research programme in 2017, he worked in research, research management, and policy communication roles at the Council for the Development of Social Science Research in Africa, the UN University for Peace's Africa program, and at the International Monetary Fund headquarters in Washington, DC. Akum's research covers violent conflicts, governance, and human security in the Lake Chad Basin and broader Central Africa. Akum has an MA from American University's School of International Service and a PhD from the University of London's School of Oriental and African Studies.

Riccardo Alcaro

Riccardo Alcaro is research coordinator and head of the global actors program at the Institute of International Affairs in Rome. He is also a fellow of the European Foreign and Security Policy Studies program. His main area of expertise is transatlantic relations, with a special focus on U.S. and European policies in Europe's surrounding regions. Alcaro has been a visiting fellow at the Center on the United States and Europe at the Brookings Institution in Washington, DC, and was a contributor to the *European Policy Analyst*, the Economist Intelligence Unit's quarterly publication on the European Union. He is the author of *Europe and Iran's Nuclear Crisis* and editor of *The Liberal Order and Its Contestations* and *The West and the Global Power Shift*. Alcaro holds a PhD from the University of Tübingen.

Sergio M. Alcocer

Sergio M. Alcocer is president of the Mexican Council on Foreign Relations, research professor at the National Autonomous University of Mexico's (UNAM) Institute of Engineering, and adjunct professor at the University of Texas at San Antonio (UTSA). Alcocer is also the president of Mexico Exponencial, a think tank for the development of public policy and strategies for embracing exponential technologies. He is former undersecretary for North America in the Mexican Ministry of Foreign Affairs and undersecretary for strategic planning and technology development at the Mexican Ministry of Energy. He is chair of Mexico City's Advisory Committee on Earthquake and Resilience and member of the Advisory Committee on Structural Safety. Alcocer is an international member of the U.S. National Academy of Engineering, member of the Mexican Academy of Sciences and Fundación ICA, honorary member and former president of the Mexican Society of Structural Engineering (SMIE), and former president of the Academy of Engineering of Mexico. He was previously secretary general, coordinator for innovation and development, and director of the Institute of Engineering at UNAM. He was also a nonexecutive member of the board of Empresas ICA and chair of the board of Iberdrola México. Alcocer has received an honorary degree from the University of Arizona, the UNAM Prize for Young Academics, the Mexican Academy of Science's prize for research, the SMIE prize for structural housing engineering, and the American Concrete Institute's Charles S. Whitney Medal. Alcocer was inducted into the National Academy of Engineering for improvements to the seismic safety of buildings in developing countries through improved design standards and government policies. He received his BS in civil engineering from UNAM and his PhD in structures from UTSA.

Steven Blockmans

Steven Blockmans is director of the Centre for European Policy Studies and professor of European Union (EU) external relations law and governance at the University of Amsterdam. Blockmans has advised governments in Europe and Asia on their relations with the EU. He is a frequent media commentator and has been the leading author on task forces such as *More Union in European Defence* and *Regroup and Reform: Ideas for a More Responsive and Effective European Union*. His latest book, *The Obsolescence of the European Neighborhood Policy*, deals with the emergence of a more realist EU foreign policy as applied in its outer periphery. He is an editor of twenty academic volumes, including *The EU's Role in Global Governance*.

Thomas J. Bollyky

Thomas J. Bollyky is director of the Global Health program and senior fellow for global health, economics, and development at the Council on Foreign Relations (CFR). He is also an adjunct professor of law at Georgetown University. Bollyky is the author of the book *Plagues and the Paradox of Progress: Why the World Is Getting Healthier in Worrisome Ways* and the founder and managing editor of Think Global Health, an online magazine that examines the ways health shapes economies, societies, and everyday lives around the world. He directed the first two CFR-sponsored Independent Task Forces devoted to global health: Improving Pandemic Preparedness: Lessons from COVID-19 and The Emerging Global Health Crisis: Noncommunicable Diseases in Low- and Middle-Income Countries. Prior to coming to CFR, Bollyky served in a variety of positions in the U.S. government, most recently at the Office of the U.S. Trade Representative. Bollyky has testified multiple times before the U.S. Congress and Canadian Parliament, and his work has appeared in publications including *Foreign Affairs*, the *New York Times*, *Science*, and the *New England Journal of Medicine*. He has served as a consultant to the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation and as a temporary legal advisor to the World Health Organization. In 2013, the World Economic Forum named Bollyky as one of its global leaders under forty. Bollyky received a BA in biology and history from Columbia University and a JD from Stanford Law School.

José Octavio Bordón

José Octavio Bordón is president of the Argentine Council for International Relations (CARI) and director of CARI's United States committee. He is also president of the Center for the Implementation of Public Policies for Equity and Growth's international advisory council. He previously served as ambassador of Argentina in Chile (2016–19) and the United States (2003–07). He also served as national deputy and national senator representing the province of Mendoza, governor of Mendoza (1987–91), and minister of culture, education, and science of the province of Buenos Aires. In 1995, he ran for president of Argentina, obtaining second place with 30 percent of the vote. At the international level, he served as a consultant for various international organizations, including the Inter-American Development Bank, the UN Development Program (UNDP), the World Bank, and the Organization of American States (OAS). He was head of the OAS Electoral Observation Mission for the presidential elections in the Dominican Republic, Panama, and Guatemala (2008–11). During this period, he served as a special advisor to the OAS secretary-general and was political director of the UNDP-OAS Our Democracy in America project. He is a member of the Inter-American Dialogue in Washington, DC. He was an Eisenhower Global Fellow in Philadelphia and research fellow at the Woodrow Wilson

Center in Washington, DC. In 1992, he was visiting professor at Georgetown University's Center for Latin American Studies. He studied sociology at the Universidad del Salvador.

Martha Bridgman

Martha Bridgman is the editor of the South African Journal of International Affairs, the South African Institute of International Affairs' (SAIIA) peer reviewed and accredited journal, which publishes unsolicited articles from a broad range of authors. She has worked in academia, for the diplomatic service, and in the nongovernmental sector. She has also volunteered with the SAIIA Western Cape branch, holding various positions on the branch executive committee since 2000. She holds a BA in international relations from the University of California, Davis, an MSc in foreign service from Georgetown University, and a PhD in foreign policy analysis from the University of Stellenbosch.

Mely Caballero-Anthony

Mely Caballero-Anthony is professor of international relations, president's chair for international relations and security studies, and heads the Centre for Non-Traditional Security Studies at Nanyang Technological University's S. Rajaratnam School of International Studies (RSIS). Caballero-Anthony teaches courses on nontraditional security in Asia and security governance, is a member of the Asia-Pacific Leadership Network on Nuclear Non-Proliferation, and has served as the secretary-general of the Consortium on Non-Traditional Security Studies in Asia since 2008. Caballero-Anthony's research interests include regionalism and multilateralism in Asia-Pacific, global governance, human security and non-traditional security, nuclear security, and conflict prevention. From 2015 to 2017, she was vice president-at-large of the governing council of the International Studies Association (ISA) and is a member of ISA's Global South Task Force. In 2015, she was a visiting fellow at George Washington University's Elliott School of International Affairs. From 2013 to 2017, Caballero-Anthony was a member of the UN secretary-general's advisory board on disarmament matters, and served at its chairperson in 2016. From 2011 to 2012, she was director of external relations at the Association of Southeast Asian Nations secretariat. She has published extensively on a broad range of Asia-Pacific political and security issues in peer-reviewed journals and international academic press. Her latest books include Negotiating Governance on Non-Traditional Security in Southeast Asia and Beyond, An Introduction to Non-Traditional Security Studies and Asia on the Move.

Chen Dongxiao

Chen Dongxiao is the president of the Shanghai Institutes for International Studies (SIIS). He specializes in the studies of the United Nations, Chinese foreign policy, and U.S.-China relations and has published extensively on UN reform and China's multilateral diplomacy. Chen is the editor in chief of the *China Quarterly of International Strategic Studies*, published by SIIS and World Scientific Publishing in Singapore. He is adjunct professor at Shanghai International Studies University. Chen is also a high-level advisor to the independent team of advisors for the UN Economic and Social Council dialogue on longer-term positioning of the UN development system, member of the Association for Southeast Asian Nations' Regional Forum Experts and Eminent Persons Group, senior advisor on economic diplomacy to China's foreign ministry, and senior advisor to the mayor of Shanghai's international business leaders' advisory council. He is also vice chair of the China National Association

of International Relations. Chen was recognized as a Leading Scholar of Shanghai in 2012. Chen received his PhD from Fudan University.

Chaesung Chun

Chaesung Chun is chair of the East Asia Institute's National Security Center and professor at Seoul National University's department of political science and international relations, teaching international relations theory and security studies. He is a member of the advisory committee for South Korea's Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Ministry of Defense, and Ministry of Unification. He was a visiting professor at Keio University in Tokyo from 2017 to 2018 and 2010 to 2011. He was director of Seoul National University's Center for International Studies. His major works include *Northeast Asian International Relations Theory: Politics among Incomplete Sovereign States, Sovereignty and International Relations: Modern Sovereign States System and the Evolution of the Empire, and Is Politics Moral: Reinhold Niebuhr's Transcendental Realism.* He received his BA and MA from Seoul National University and his PhD in international relations theory from Northwestern University.

Yose Rizal Damuri

Yose Rizal Damuri is the head of the department of economics at the Centre for Strategic and International Studies. His research activities focus on international trade, regional integration, and value chain globalization. He serves as co-chair of the Indonesian National Committee for Pacific Economic Cooperation and is a member of the governing board of the Economic Research Institute for ASEAN and East Asia (ERIA). He is active in many of research networks in East Asia, such as the Asia-Pacific Research and Training Network on Trade, ERIA's Research Institutes Network, and Think 20. Damuri is also active in several Indonesian policy forums, including as founder and research coordinator for the Indonesia Services Dialogue, a forum dedicated to services sector development in Indonesia. He received his PhD in international economics from the Graduate Institute of International and Development Studies.

Ralf Emmers

Ralf Emmers is dean of the S. Rajaratnam School of International Studies and president's chair in international relations at Nanyang Technological University. His research interests include security studies, international institutions in the Asia-Pacific, and the security and international politics of Southeast Asia. He is the author and editor of eleven books and monographs, including *Geopolitics and Maritime Territorial Disputes in East Asia, Resource Management and Contested Territories in East Asia*, and *Security Strategies of Middle Powers in the Asia-Pacific*, coauthored with Sarah Teo. He is also coeditor of the forthcoming *Oxford Handbook on Peaceful Change in International Relations*. He completed his MSc and PhD in the London School of Economics and Political Science's international relations department.

Ferdinando Nelli Feroci

Ferdinando Nelli Feroci is president of the Institute of International Affairs and professor at Luiss University's School of Government. He was appointed as Italy's member of the European Commission in 2014. From 1972 to 2013, he served as a diplomat, permanent representative of Italy to the European Union, chief of staff to the Italian minister of foreign affairs, and director general for European

integration at the Italian Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Previously, he served at the United Nations and in Algeria, China, and France and was advisor to the vice president of the Italian Council of Ministers. Nelli Feroci was previously a fellow at Harvard University's Center for International Affairs and a visiting professor at the Istituto Universitario Orientale in Naples. He is the author of many articles and essays on international relations, European affairs, and political affairs. He holds a doctorate in international law from the University of Pisa and a postdoctoral specialization in international relations from the Italian Society for International Organizations in Rome.

Michael Fullilove

Michael Fullilove is executive director of the Lowy Institute, where he served as director of its global issues program from 2003 to 2012. Previously, he was a visiting fellow in foreign policy at the Brookings Institution, an advisor to Prime Minister Paul Keating of Australia, and a lawyer. He remains a nonresident senior fellow at the Brookings Institution. He has written several books and writes widely on Australian and U.S. foreign policy for the *Financial Times, Foreign Affairs*, the *New York Times*, and the Australian press, among others. In 2019, he was appointed a member of the Order of Australia for significant service to international relations. He graduated in arts and law from the University of Sydney and the University of New South Wales and studied as a Rhodes scholar at Oxford University, where he received a master's degree and doctorate in international relations.

Thomas Gomart

Thomas Gomart is director of the French Institute of International Relations (Ifri). Previously, he was vice president for strategic development and the director and founder of Ifri's Russia/NIS Center. Before joining Ifri, Gomart was an assistant professor at Sorbonne University and a cadet officer. His work has focused on the former Soviet Union and wider international issues such as security, energy, and digital governance. He was previously a Lavoisier fellow at the Moscow State Institute of International Relations, visiting fellow at the European Union Institute for Security Studies, and Marie Curie fellow at King's College London's Department of War Studies. Gomart's recent publications include *Notre Intérêt National*, edited with Thierry de Montbrial; *Europe: Subject or Object in the Geopolitics of Data?*, edited with Julien Nocetti and Clément Tonon; *L'Affolement du Monde: 10 Enjeux Géopolitique*; and *Guerres Invisibles: Nos prochains défis géopolitiques*. He is a member of the strategic review committee for the Defence and National Security Strategic Review 2017 and a member of the editorial board of the French journals *Etudes, Politique Etrangère*, and *Revue des Deux Mondes*. Gomart received his EMBA from Hautes Etudes Commerciales de Paris and his PhD in history from Pantheon-Sorbonne University.

Daniel Gros

Daniel Gros is a distinguished fellow at the Centre for European Policy Studies (CEPS), previously serving as director of CEPS for twenty years. He holds a Fulbright fellowship and is a visiting professor at the University of California, Berkeley. Gros is also an advisor to the European Parliament and a member of the European Systemic Risk Board's advisory scientific council. Gros previously worked at the International Monetary Fund and collaborated with the European Commission as economic advisor to the Delors Committee, which developed plans for the Economic and Monetary Union of the

European Union. He has been a member of high-level advisory bodies to the French and Belgian governments and has advised numerous central banks and governments, including those of the United States, Greece, and the United Kingdom. He has published extensively on international economic affairs, including monetary and fiscal policy, exchange rates, banking, and climate change. He is the author of several books and editor of *Économie Internationale* and *International Finance*. He has taught at several leading European universities and contributes a globally syndicated column on European economic issues to Project Syndicate. He holds a PhD in economics from the University of Chicago.

Steven Gruzd

Steven Gruzd is head of the African Governance and Diplomacy programme at the South African Institute of International Affairs (SAIIA). He rejoined SAIIA in this capacity in 2013 after spending two years as senior researcher and diplomatic liaison at the South African Jewish Board of Deputies. He first joined SAIIA in 2003 as the research manager of the New Partnership for Africa's Development and Governance programme, also serving as head of its successor programme on Governance and the African Peer Review Mechanism in 2008. He also worked as a researcher and research coordinator at the Centre for Development and Enterprise from 1999–2003. He has published widely on governance and the African Peer Review Mechanism, and keenly follows African political developments and South African foreign policy. He hosted a magazine community radio talk show on 101.9 ChaiFM, and has made numerous radio and television appearances. Gruzd holds a BA in international relations from the University of the Witwatersrand and an MSc in international relations from the London School of Economics and Political Science.

Guan Guihai

Guan Guihai is executive vice president of the Institute of International and Strategic Studies at Peking University. He is also associate professor at Peking University's School of International Studies, director of Peking University's Center for Modern Russian Studies, consultant to the Chinese Ministry of Education's subcommittee on Sino-Russian cooperation, and editorial board member of the academic journal *Region*. His academic interests include Russian diplomacy, Sino-Russian relations, Chinese and Russian contemporary political and social transitions, the Shanghai Cooperation Organization, and the social-political development of Central Asian countries. His publications include *Great Europe: Honor and Dream*, *Yeltsin's Years in Power*, and more than thirty articles in Chinese, English, Japanese, and Russian. Guan was a visiting scholar at the University of Münnesota from 2004 to 2005 and a visiting professor at the University of Vienna and the University of Würzburg from 2012 to 2013. Guan has a BA and an MA from Peking University and a PhD from Moscow State Institute of International Relations.

Richard N. Haass

Richard N. Haass is a veteran diplomat and influential voice on American foreign policy. He is serving his eighteenth year as president of the Council on Foreign Relations, the preeminent independent, nonpartisan organization in the United States devoted to issues of foreign policy and international relations. He has served as senior Middle East advisor to President George H.W. Bush, as the State Department's director of policy planning under Secretary of State Colin Powell, and in various positions in the Defense and State departments during the Jimmy Carter and Ronald Reagan administrations. He was also U.S. coordinator for policy toward the future of Afghanistan and the U.S. envoy to both the Cyprus and Northern Ireland peace talks. A recipient of the State Department's Distinguished Honor Award, the Presidential Citizens Medal, and the Tipperary International Peace Award, Haass is also the author or editor of fourteen books on U.S. foreign policy and one book on management. His latest book is *The World: A Brief Introduction*. A Rhodes scholar, he holds master's and doctorate of philosophy degrees from Oxford University and is the recipient of numerous honorary degrees.

Jennifer A. Hillman

Jennifer A. Hillman is a senior fellow at the Council on Foreign Relations and a professor at the Georgetown University Law Center. Hillman has had a distinguished career in public service. In 2012, she completed her term as one of seven members serving on the Appellate Body, the highest court of the World Trade Organization (WTO). As a commissioner at the U.S. International Trade Commission, she adjudicated trade remedy cases and conducted trade-related economic studies. Through her work as general counsel at the Office of the U.S. Trade Representative (USTR), Hillman was involved in all litigation matters coming before panels of the North American Free Trade Agreement or the WTO. She negotiated bilateral agreements with forty-five countries while serving as USTR's ambassador and chief textiles negotiator. Before joining USTR, she was the legislative director for U.S. Senator Terry Sanford (D-NC). Hillman was a partner in the law firm of Cassidy Levy Kent, a senior transatlantic fellow for the German Marshall Fund of the United States, and a member of the selection panel for the Harry S. Truman Scholarship Foundation. She serves on the board of visitors of the Sanford School of Public Policy at Duke University. She is a graduate of Harvard Law School and Duke University.

Sunjoy Joshi

Sunjoy Joshi is chair and chief executive of the Observer Research Foundation (ORF). Over the past ten years, he has spearheaded ORF's rise as India's premier think tank on global affairs. He began his career with the government in India as a member of the Indian Administrative Service in 1983, serving in various capacities for twenty-five years. His last posting with the government of India was as joint secretary in the Ministry of Petroleum and Natural Gas. He has previously been the governmentnominated director of the boards of national energy companies such as the Oil and Natural Gas Corporation (ONGC), ONGC Videsh Limited, Oil India Limited, Mangalore Refinery, and Petrochemicals Limited. He was also managing director of the Madhya Pradesh Energy Development Agency and served as chair of M.P. Windfarms. Joshi took premature retirement in 2009 to pursue his academic interest in energy, climate change, technology, and development. Joshi has been a visiting associate at the International Institute of Strategic Studies and a distinguished visitor to Stanford University's energy and sustainable development program. He speaks and publishes on the world of technology, energy, and development and started the YouTube show India's World, which features commentary on global and current affairs in Hindi. He earned a master's degree in English literature from Allahabad University and a master's degree in development studies from the University of East Anglia, Norwich.

Memduh Karakullukçu

Memduh Karakullukçu is founding board member of the Global Relations Forum (GRF). He was the first president of GRF from 2009 to 2019. Karakullukçu also serves as founding partner of the Turkish online legal informatics initiative Kanunum and chair of the international advisory firm Kroton Consulting. His policy work includes technology and economic development, technology and security, global energy dynamics, and global economic and financial governance. Previously, he served as founding managing director of Istanbul Technical University's (ITU) ARI Science Park, Istanbul's leading technology entrepreneurship community. During his tenure at ITU, Karakullukçu was senior advisor to the president; coordinator of the law, technology, and policy graduate program; and strategic advisor at the university's Center for Satellite Communications. Yasushi Kudo

Yasushi Kudo is founder and president of the Genron NPO. Under Kudo's leadership, Genron NPO has conducted various research programs, including evaluations of government performance and analyses of party pledges made during general elections. With its Northeast Asia regional program, Kudo has developed crucial track two dialogues, such as the annual Tokyo-Beijing Forum and Japan-Korea Future Dialogue, to tackle pressing regional issues. In 2017, Kudo launched the Tokyo Conference, a discussion platform that invites ten international think tanks to exchange views on global issues and propose recommendations to strengthen the liberal order and democracy. He established the Asia Forum of Opinion Leaders in 2016 as a venue for open and free debate among intellectuals in Japan and Southeast Asian countries. The forum is a collaborative effort to bolster democracy and address challenges the democratic system faces, with a goal of jointly identifying common issues and presenting policy options. Prior to founding Genron NPO, Kudo was editor in chief of the political journal *Ronso Toyo Keizai*. He holds a master's degree in economics from Yokohama City University.

Łukasz Kulesa

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Jusuf Wanandi is senior fellow and cofounder of the Centre for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS) in Jakarta, Indonesia, and vice chair of the board of trustees of the CSIS Foundation. He is vice chair of the Indonesian National Committee for Pacific Economic Cooperation and co-chair of the Council for Security Cooperation in the Asia-Pacific, Indonesia. He is also president and director of the publishing company of the *Jakarta Post*, vice chair of the board of trustees of Prasetiya Mulya University, and chair of the Panca Bhakti University Foundation. A lawyer by training, Wanandi was assistant professor of law at the University of Indonesia and has served in various national and international organizations in the course of his career. He also published his political memoir, *Shades of Grey*, in 2013 and his contributions from thirty years at the *Jakarta Post*, *Testimony of Changes*, in 2017.

Amos Yadlin

Amos Yadlin is former executive director of Tel Aviv University's Institute for National Security Studies (INSS), Israel's leading strategic think tank—a position he held from November 2011 to May 2021. His areas of expertise include strategy and national security, changes in the Middle East, the Iranian nuclear challenge, U.S.-Israel relations, force buildup and the defense budget, intelligence, cyber-related challenges, civil-military relations, and the military ethics of fighting terror. Prior to joining INSS, Yadlin served over forty years in the Israel Defense Forces (IDF), with ten years as a member of the IDF general staff. He served as the IDF's chief of defense intelligence from 2006 to 2010, the IDF attaché to the United States from 2004 to 2006, and commander of the IDF military colleges and the National Defense College from 2002 to 2004.
